

# Environmental Scan of Resources for Individuals with FASD who are also involved in the Criminal Legal System in British Columbia

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## Executive Summary

This environmental scan was conducted as part of a larger research project, entitled *“Increasing capacity to identify and support individuals with FASD and complex neurodevelopmental needs in British Columbia”*, which is funded by the Law Foundation of BC. The overall aim of the project is to improve the services and supports received by individuals with FASD and other neurodevelopmental conditions in the legal system and ultimately improve their trajectory and outcomes. Two key objectives include: 1) Building and enhancing the informal legal and clinical community of practice for professionals, agencies, and service providers who support and engage with youth and adults with FASD in BC; and 2) Developing and implementing an FASD screening toolkit with accompanying resources, informed by the current FASD screening tool used in The Asante Centre’s Youth Justice Program. In addition to these two objectives, the team will then train professionals in the criminal legal sector across BC on the use of the toolkit. In the process of these activities, the team aims to create an informal community of practice focused on FASD within the criminal legal sector.

The goal of this scan was to compile a list of resources available in BC that might be helpful for individuals with FASD who are involved in the criminal legal system. To our knowledge, no such recent or local compilation of relevant resources exists for the criminal legal sphere, and community stakeholder feedback has indicated that there is great demand for such a resource. Our hope is that this scan can be utilized by professionals to quickly get a sense of what is available, and what kinds of services or agencies might be helpful to connect with while supporting individuals with FASD within the criminal legal context. The scan is focused on resources accessible to both youth ages 12 and up, as well as adults. For the purposes of this scan, our definition of a resource includes support and advocacy groups and service providers.

This scan has highlighted how few resources there are in BC that are tailored specifically to individuals with undiagnosed or diagnosed FASD within the criminal legal context, with only five resources existing with this specific focus. Additionally, when the entirety of the resources in the scan are considered, there are fewer resources available to adults than youth under 19 years of age. The identified resources have been organized into four categories: FASD specific resources, general support services, disability specific supports, and criminal legal system resources. In addition, we created four appendices to include additional resources that fell outside of the definition outlined above, but that may nonetheless be helpful for criminal legal professionals. These include programs in other provinces, and an extensive directory of FASD Key Workers and Indigenous Justice Programs located across BC.

The intention of this scan is to create a generative, collaborative document that can change over time, and eventually become a web-based resource. As such, we are open to additions to our list, feedback on use of the list, and comments on future improvements. ## Introduction

### Background

This environmental scan was conducted as part of a multi-year research project funded by the Law Foundation of BC. This scan was conducted by staff at The Asante Centre, which serves as the community partner for the project. The Asante Centre, governed by the registered charitable organization the Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorder (FASD) Society for British Columbia (BC), is an assessment, support, and advocacy organization committed to helping individuals with FASD and other brain-based disabilities reach their full potential.

### Objectives

The environmental scan portion of the project is designed to compile existing resources and services in BC that may be helpful to individuals involved with the criminal legal system who have FASD. This includes resources that require that an individual is diagnosed with FASD to access the resource, as well as resources for those without a diagnosis. As mentioned above, the overarching goal of this project is to update the existing Asante Centre FASD screening tool in line with current empirical knowledge, then distribute the tool and an accompanying toolkit designed for criminal legal professionals. When this distribution and implementation occurs, it is important that **professionals using the screening toolkit know which resources and services can be referred to and accessed by clients with FASD.**

To our knowledge, a resource list or directory with a tailored focus on supports for individuals with FASD in a criminal legal context does not yet exist. Anecdotally, we have learned that local professionals in the field are highly supportive of this endeavor and are eager to access the resulting document. The creation of this scan also contributes towards the goal of developing a strong community of practice in BC amongst professionals within the criminal legal systems who work with individuals with FASD.

## Methods

### Strategy for Identification of Resources and Services

A variety of methods were used to identify key services that may be relevant for individuals with FASD who are involved in the criminal legal system. The following sources of information were utilized:

- a) Current and former Asante Centre staff members
- b) Prior environmental scans
- c) Internet resources (e.g., linked websites)
- d) Resources identified by the Advisory Committee
- e) Resources identified in the process of conducting the scan

The first step for conducting this environmental scan involved learning from the wealth of experience and knowledge held by The Asante Centre team members. Current and former staff

members generated many of the initial resources and services for the scan. Our research partner team and the Advisory Committee for this project were also canvassed for suggestions. We identified prior FASD-relevant environmental scans published in the academic literature. Existing environmental scans provided additional resources and formatting ideas for our final document. When checking the websites of the initial list of resources, we followed links to any associated websites, resources, or services. We included these new resources if they were similar to already identified resources or would potentially meet the needs of individuals with FASD.

Once an initial resource list was created, Meghan Schuurman, Special Projects Coordinator at the Asante Centre, confirmed contact information for the identified resources. Through conversations with professionals from these initial programs and services, additional resources were identified and added. Lastly, a draft of the final version of the scan was circulated to the Advisory Committee for this project. The Advisory Committee includes 17 professionals working in different parts of the criminal legal sector (see acknowledgments for a detailed description). With their input, further resources were added.

### Selection Criteria

In conducting the environmental scan, we had two objectives: to highlight specific resources available in BC, and discover innovative programs or practices Canada-wide that could eventually be implemented in BC.

For the primary, BC-focused environmental scan, we included resources that:

- a) Comprised programs and resources for support (e.g., specialized courts, assessment centres, additional programs/organizations, specialized staff including key workers and system navigators, and professionals with FASD training), and advocacy services (e.g., advocacy groups and resources, support groups [in-person and virtual], and support networks).
- b) Were relevant to BC (either physically offered in BC, or a virtual resource available to people living in BC).
- c) Included accurate and up-to-date contact information.

These inclusion criteria resulted in 55 resources being included in the primary environmental scan.

For the secondary scan, we explored the wider landscape of similar FASD resources and services across Canada to capture innovative programs or practices that are being used in other regions. The inclusion criteria for these national resources comprised services or programs working directly at the intersection of supporting individuals with FASD involved in the criminal legal system. We looked for programs that promoted community collaboration and mobilized professionals in the criminal legal system to become FASD-informed. We included them as inspiration for what the future of FASD resources and services in BC could look like given



appropriate funding and infrastructure investment. These inclusion criteria resulted in 9 resources being included in the secondary scan (see Appendix A). However, this is not the full extent of resources and services available nationally, as many programs or services did not respond to our requests for information in time for the scan to be finalized.

Many additional resources were collected during the primary and secondary scan research process. Given the dearth of available relevant resources, we also included key training and education resources in Appendix B. Given their comprehensive nature, information about the BC FASD Keyworker program was included in Appendix C, and the Indigenous Program Directory in Appendix D. Duplications were consolidated.

It is important to note that the environmental scan **did not involve any kind of formal quality assurance component**. As such, The Asante Centre, research partners, and project funders take no responsibility for the practices implemented by the resources listed, or for the positions that they may represent. It is up to the end user of this scan to do their due diligence prior to accessing these resources and services. In addition, any web-based resources are up to date only at the time of the creation of this scan, and links may be broken or out of date when the scan is accessed at a later time.

## Findings

The most important finding of the primary scan of BC based resources was that **very few resources** (only five) were explicitly designed to address the specific needs of individuals with FASD who are involved in the criminal legal system. These are described below.

1. *Mariah Keary Cottage* offers supportive housing to men with undiagnosed or diagnosed FASD, who are over 19 years of age, and have been discharged from a Correctional Services Canada site with a conditional release.
2. *The Asante Centre's Youth Justice program*, in partnership with Ministry of Children and Family Development, offers assessment services to youth involved in the criminal legal system who meet screening criteria for FASD.
3. The *Integrated and Transitional Release Planning (ITRP)* program within BC Corrections offers a pathway to FASD assessment for adults who are incarcerated, offering them a chance to start assessment at The Asante Centre prior to release.
4. Two virtual resources from our education and training appendix are included, as they were also specifically designed to address the intersection of FASD and the criminal legal system:
  - a. CanFASD's online training course *FASD for Judicial and Legal Professionals Level II*, which offers education to professionals in the criminal legal system (for a fee)
  - b. The Justice Institute of BC's course *Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorder*, which is available to those working within the BC Correctional system.

Despite the lack of combined FASD *and* criminal legal specific resources, we identified many more resources that are adjacent to this specific focus. Figure 1 provides a visual representation of how these resources can be conceptualized. Some resources fit into one category, while others might fit into the overlap between two or more categories. Resources that most closely fit in the centre, represented by the star, are the five resources mentioned above, which are for individuals with diagnosed or possible FASD and criminal legal or justice involvement. The specific resources included are delineated in Table 1.

### Conclusion

The lack of resources specifically intended for individuals with FASD and criminal legal involvement in BC, and Canada more broadly, reveals several gaps to be addressed across research, practice, and policy. The current scan highlights the need for both increased FASD screening amongst individuals involved in the criminal legal system, as well as the investment of resources to create relevant supports and services for those identified. Current access to FASD assessment and diagnosis in the adult population is limited, with little public funding available. The adult assessment process is complicated by the difficulty of confirming prenatal alcohol exposure when the individual is of an older age. As a result, with fewer diagnosed individuals, there may be a perception that the demand for such specific resources is low, instead of the low demand reflecting a large undiagnosed population.

We anticipate that the BC based community of practice created through the range of activities of this project will be well-positioned to advocate for the creation of such resources and services in the future, and that the newly updated screening toolkit will result in increased assessment and diagnosis of individuals involved in the criminal legal system. The development of such resources and services would benefit from being modeled on the programs highlighted in other provinces in Appendix A.

This document is dynamic, and may eventually become a web-based tool. Our hope is that such a tool could be utilized by any member of the public and updated as more resources and services are identified. <b>Description</b>	The Yukon Community Wellness Court (CWC) is a judicially supervised therapeutic program aimed at providing treatment and support for individuals involved in the criminal legal system who are living with an addiction to alcohol or drugs, mental health issues, and/or an intellectual disability including but not limited to FASD. The CWC combines intensive monitoring of individuals with a comprehensive approach to addressing the psycho-social needs of participants. Individuals must plead guilty before entering the program, and individualized wellness plans are developed.
